

Frames of Reference

- Mezirow's learning theory (1978, 1991, 2008) posits that people give meaning to new experiences using their frames or reference, i.e., their accumulated ideas, concepts, values, emotions, & conditioned responses that guide their behavior.
- People tend to reject ideas that do not align with their frames of reference as they may be viewed as strange, unrelated, or misinformed.
- However, some circumstances can alter people's frames of references by targeting their habits and points of view leading to transformation.

"The largest limitation for me during the trip was the language barrier. It took a while to change my thought process from feeling like my voice wasn't valued at the table to one of a learner and observer. Since leaving Panama, I have practiced my Spanish **EVERYDAY.**" (Overcoming Challenges)

"Throughout the trip, I struggled with my personal feelings toward unequal distribution of resources among countries, However, I hope to continue advocating for the marginalized and more vulnerable in order to reduce distribution among groups." (Overcoming Challenges)







Empowerment / Inspiration

"To me Panama was a place of growth. I truly feel different after returning home, I feel stronger, open, and mindful." (Increased self-awareness / insight)

"As an American we grow up with the concept that we as a nation are the best. We grow up believing that our way is the best way....however...Panama has changed that by seeing the different agencies and how they run their successful program was really eye opening. Maybe the American way is not always the best way." (Systems Contrasts)

Empowerment / Inspiration



"Little did I know that it would shift my perspective both on a personal and professional level ...learned a new way of life, ...once in a lifetime experiences lie right outside my comfort zone, met new people who became good friends and fellow colleagues, now view everything through a different lens....To me, this trip taught me more about myself in 10 days than the last 25 years of my life. To me, this trip meant discovering that I really don't have any limits and that I can overcome any experience that might be scary and nerve racking." (Eye-opening experiences)



Community

"In our visit to La Asociación de Trabajadores Sociales de Panama, we got to listen to a beautiful speech given by the president of the association, she gave a strong and honest speech that highlighted her passion for social work and the importance of serving others. Her speech was perhaps the one thing that had the biggest impact on me as a social worker." (Professional Unity)

Transformation in Professional Perspective

 #6 "After studying abroad I can envision where I can fit macro perspectives of legislation or changing agency practice into my life."

 #4 "This trip was life changing. My interest has shifted...interested in really learning about macro level social work and the impact it can have."



Inspiration and Community with Universities and Agencies Visited

 #3 "Every social worker that we met was passionate and very inspiring as evidenced by their tone of voice and stories they shared."

 #9 "The university and agency partners were so welcoming, and it was clear that their heart was in their work as they were giving us tours."



Overall Transformative Effects

#7 "There was a feeling to everything, a special meaning that in some cases cannot be described. It was just a feeling that solidified why we were there."

#3 "This experience is something I haven't been able to stop talking about because of the huge impact it has made in my education and personal life."



Transformative Realizations in a Less-Resourced Versus a More Resourced Country

• #4 "This was my first of many big "wow" moments in [County] This experience allowed for me to see how a pretty confident super-power like the United States, can learn so much from a country that is smaller and would be considered having less than us but are doing work that we have not yet figured out."

• #8 The environment, and the values that the staff from [Agency] expressed felt completely different to me than the foster care facility that I worked at...It made me realize the different approaches that the United States could be using when working with foster children."



So did the Destination Matter?

• The more I looked, the fewer differences in the types of transformation in Panama versus Italy I saw.

• If a program is developed with diverse experiences related to discipline, prepares students of all backgrounds in advance, and builds in reflection during and after study abroad, transformation can occur in any destination!



Key Elements of Transformation

- Preparation and commitment are key regardless of destination (pre-trip course content).
- Active learning & participation required
- Cultural immersion (get students out of their bubble)
- Reflect, reflect, reflect!
